Topic

This term we are looking at People who Help in Our Community.

Personal, Social and Emotional

- Builds constructive and respectable relationships
- See themselves as a valuable individual.
- Encourage turn taking.
- Express feelings and consider feelings of others.
- Work as part of a team and understand and follow rules.
- Manage own basic hygiene and personal needs.

Communication and Language

- Understand how to listen carefully and why listening is important.
- Develop social phrases
- Learn rhymes, poems and songs.
- Listen to and talk about stories to build familiarity and understanding.
- Describe events in some detail
- Learn new vocabulary.

Physical Development

- Develop the overall body strength, co-ordination, balance and agility
- Know and talk about the different factors that support their overall health and wellbeing: regular physical activity, healthy eating, tooth brushing, sensible amounts of 'screen time', having a good sleep routine, being a safe pedestrian
- Develop spatial awareness
- Explore travelling and moving in different ways

English/Phonics and Maths



RWI:

We will continue to focus on the Set 1 sounds.

- Learn new sounds daily according to the needs of the children.
- Practise writing taught letter sound. It is really important that your child holds the pencil and forms the letters correctly.
- Please practise writing their name every day.
- Begin to blend and segment sounds for reading and writing.

We will read:

A variety of fiction and non-fiction books about the people who help us in our community and the jobs that they do. In addition, we will read a selection of autumn/winter stories.

Maths:

- Children will explore the characteristics and attributes of 2D and 3D shapes through play.
- Children will continue to engage with activities that underline the purpose of counting to find out 'how many' objects there are altogether.
- Children will compare the number of objects in 2 sets.
- The children will begin to explore composition by focusing on the preliminary skills: the concept of 'wholes' and 'parts'. They will build on their understanding of the composition of numbers by investigating the composition of 3, 4 and 5.

Expressive Arts and Design
